How Collaborative Alliances Are Revolutionizing Indiana's New Diploma Pathways (Rm. 130-131)

With the 2029 diploma redesign requiring significant Work-Based Learning (WBL) hours (75 to 650+), school corporations are searching for consistent, scalable ways to manage programs without "reinventing the wheel." This session showcases the WBL Alliance, a statewide initiative led by the Education Service Centers of Indiana (ESCI), and the WBL Alliance Resource Hub, a centralized repository of training plans, coordinator guides, and legal frameworks.

You Don't Need More Space: Transforming Schools Without Major New Construction (Rm. 132-133)

School districts today are being asked to do more—expand programs, adapt to evolving educational needs, and modernize aging facilities—all while working within limited and tight budgets. The instinct is often to build new. But in many cases, the opportunity is already there.

In this session, architecture, engineering and district leadership perspectives will come together to explore how schools can get more out of the buildings they already have. By rethinking how space is used, making targeted renovations, and investing in smarter, more efficient building systems, including improved HVAC and energy-efficient solutions, districts can create environments that better support teaching and learning while maximizing long-term value.

Panelists will introduce the SPACE framework—Study, Prioritize, Align, Collaborate and Expand—and show how the framework was applied at North Posey High School to support evolving educational programs, strengthen community partnerships, improve operational efficiency, and create more adaptable learning environments. Attendees will leave with actionable ideas and a replicable framework for evaluating space needs, prioritizing investments, and aligning facility improvements with district goals.

The session will demonstrate how aligning the school board, district leadership, administrators, teachers, and students around a shared vision created a culture of continuous improvement and increased student achievement.

Indiana Department of Education Update: Advancing Education Priorities Across Indiana (Rm. 130-131)

Join the Indiana Department of Education (IDOE) for a timely update on the state's education priorities, initiatives, and emerging policy developments impacting Indiana schools. This session will provide school board members and superintendents with the latest information on key legislative and regulatory updates, academic initiatives, accountability, school improvement efforts, educator workforce developments, and other issues shaping K-12 education.

Right-Sizing Without Disruption: How One Corporation Saved \$14M While Protecting Classrooms (Rm. 132-133)

School corporations are facing a new fiscal reality: declining enrollment, local birth rate stagnation, constrained state funding, and property tax reforms that limit local revenue. More often than not, these headwinds lead to reactive cuts, fractured trust, and significant classroom disruption. This session offers a different approach. The Monroe County Community School Corporation (MCCSC) implemented a disciplined two-year financial strategy designed to align costs, especially staffing across all employee groups, to student enrollment and declining revenue. The result: over \$13.2 million in savings across two school years while limiting teacher layoffs to just one teacher and a handful of non-certified staff.

Workshop participants will learn how MCCSC prioritized people and classrooms through a structured Strategic Staffing Model, where 79% of staffing cost savings were achieved through natural attrition and position transfers, not layoffs. In addition, 57% of total savings came from non-classroom areas, demonstrating a disciplined commitment to protecting the student experience.

This session will highlight how proactive, transparent communication and strong board-superintendent alignment were essential to implementing consequential decisions while maintaining organizational trust.

From Vision to Impact: A Leadership Playbook for Building Community-Driven Career Pathways (Rm. 134-135)

School districts across Indiana are navigating significant changes in how students demonstrate readiness for life after graduation, with new Graduation Pathways emphasizing work-based learning, industry credentials, and career-aligned experiences. As expectations shift, school leaders are being challenged to rethink how they deliver Career and Technical Education in ways that are relevant, accessible, and aligned with workforce needs.

In Hancock County, a “perfect storm” of factors—growing student demand for career pathways, regional workforce shortages, limited local access to training, and strong alignment across school, community, and industry leadership—led to the development of the Amplify Hancock initiative. Representing a multi-district collaboration across four school corporations, this effort provides a scalable, community-driven model for delivering high-impact Career and Technical Education.

This session brings together perspectives from a superintendent, school board member, county commissioner, and program leadership to share practical insights into how this initiative was developed and implemented. Panelists will discuss how they built and sustained business and industry partnerships and aligned board and community leadership to create programming that supports immersive, hands-on learning tied directly to workforce needs.

Attendees will hear candid lessons learned—including challenges, missteps, and what they would do differently—and will leave with practical strategies that can be applied in districts of any size, with or without major capital investment. The session will include moderated discussion and audience interaction to help participants explore how these ideas can be adapted within their own communities.

Seeing is Believing: Using Visual Storytelling to Build Support for School Facilities (Rm. 136-137)

When school corporations face facility needs, the difference between community hesitation and community support often comes down to communication. For DeKalb County Central United Schools, a successful facility planning process required a visual, proactive communication strategy that helped stakeholders understand the “why” behind the project before misinformation, uncertainty, or financial concerns could define the conversation.

DeKalb County Central United Schools and Garmann Miller will share how district leadership, board members, architects, and communication professionals worked together to tell a cohesive project story and build understanding in the community. The session will explore how drone footage, photography, 3D renderings, Revit modeling, Enscape animations, video, community meetings, and stakeholder conversations were combined into one clear message. Together, these tools helped the district inform public perception, promote the good news happening in public education, and advance a major facility project without a referendum.

Presenters will discuss how consistent messaging and high-quality visuals helped residents see existing facility needs and understand proposed solutions. The session will connect these efforts to student opportunity, fiscal stewardship, and long-term community benefit.

How District & Foundation Partnerships Can Fund Excellence in Public Education (Rm. 136-137)

As public school districts across the state face shrinking state and federal funding, education foundations play an increasingly critical role in supporting schools. At Penn-Harris-Madison School Corporation, intentional alignment between the district's Communications Department and the Penn-Harris-Madison Education Foundation (PHMEF) has transformed traditional fundraising into a strategic,

districtwide effort with measurable results. Rather than operating in separate lanes, P-H-M and PHMEF share a unified mission and messaging strategy. The impact has been significant, driven by increased awareness, record-breaking event attendance, and stronger donor engagement. Teachers benefit from innovative resources, students experience enriched learning opportunities, and community partners see a tangible return on their investment in public education.

Attendees will learn how to identify and apply practical communication strategies that leverage district channels to amplify foundation initiatives, and how strategic storytelling can connect fundraising efforts to student outcomes, build trust, and cultivate long-term community advocates. Attendees will leave with actionable tools and replicable practices to move from siloed communication to strategic alignment, demonstrating how communication can serve as a powerful catalyst for funding excellence in public education.

Two Questions, Four Pillars: AI Governance for Indiana K-12 (Rm. 138-139)

A working session for superintendents, board members, and HR on building a defensible, board-adopted AI governance posture. Gary Community School Corporation will walk through a four-pillar framework—Operations, Recruitment, Content, and Delivery—that helps districts identify where AI is already creating risk and where it can create real advantage. The session is structured as a conversation between a sitting Indiana superintendent and an ISBA Region 1 Director, drawing on a real district engagement now underway.

Every superintendent in Indiana is being asked two questions about AI right now. From the board: "How do we know our district isn't exposed?" From the community: "What are we doing with this that other districts aren't?" Most districts cannot answer either question with documented confidence, even though AI tools are already in use across HR, curriculum, communications, and classroom instruction, often without policy coverage, vendor due diligence, or board awareness. This session gives attendees a practical framework for answering both questions and a clear sense of what a defensible AI posture looks like in a K-12 context.

Introduction to the Federal School Safety Task Force's New Report with a Focus on Understanding Child Exploitation & Empowering Students to Protect Themselves (Rm. 130-131)

According to statistics from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC), in 2024, reports of online enticement (adults communicating with children for sexual purposes) rose by 192% to more than 546,000 tips, and child sex trafficking reports increased 55% to 26,823. In 2025 these numbers increased another 80%, leading to a January 27, 2026, warning memo from the Department of Homeland Security entitled "Online Recruitment of Child Sex Trafficking Becoming Endemic." With 96 percent of US teens using the internet daily, traffickers exploit social media, video games, encrypted

messaging apps, dating apps, and, increasingly, artificial intelligence to identify and manipulate victims. The NCMEC CyberTipline reported an over 60-fold increase in the use of generative AI in child sexual exploitation cases in 2025 compared to the year before.

Emerging threats to students also include financial sextortion, sadistic exploitation, and AI-generated intimate images. Child victims feel desperate, leading tragically to suicide and self-harm. With many students embarrassed or ashamed to tell their parents that they have been victimized, school resource officers are often at the front lines of these issues and when properly trained can empower students to avoid these threats or assist them in obtaining resources to prevent a tragic outcome.

This program is designed to provide an introduction to the Task Force’s report released in August and to educate the participants on the emerging threats relating to child exploitation and arm them with the tools and resources necessary to identify potential student victims and help them navigate their way through these difficult situations.

Blueprints for CTE Success: Phasing, Funding, and Partnerships that Work (Rm. 132-133)

Across Indiana, districts are reimagining how to provide students with real-world learning experiences that align with local workforce needs. The New Albany Floyd County Schools’ approach to modernizing the Prosser Career Education Center provides a practical, phased roadmap for districts seeking to expand their Career and Technical Education (CTE) offerings while balancing funding, timing, and facility constraints.

In this session, attendees will learn how the district developed a five-phase master plan to meet growing local demand in high-skill, high-wage programs—starting with the most immediate infrastructure needs while maintaining flexibility for future expansion. The project team will share key lessons learned from planning through construction, including how to prioritize program areas, minimize operational disruption, and align physical improvements with long-term educational goals.

Attendees will also hear about the district’s strategies for building community and industry partnerships to strengthen program relevance and funding potential. From leveraging state and federal CTE dollars to forming local collaborations with employers and training providers, this session will offer a holistic look at how strategic planning, design, and partnership development can come together, piece by piece—to transform any facility into a dynamic, future-ready CTE-learning environment.

Earning the Ask: How Data-Driven Engagement Changed a District’s Future (Rm. 134-135)

In 2022, the La Porte Community School Corporation launched a strategic planning process, and community survey data revealed a widespread erosion in public trust in the school system. Post-COVID

disengagement, limited financial transparency, and years of reactive communication had created perception gaps across parents, staff, business leaders, and community members alike.

Rather than respond with a marketing campaign, a multi-year strategic engagement plan grounded in the data was designed. The goal was not to sell the community on the district but to earn its trust through transparency, access, and honest conversation, especially about money.

This session tells the story of that strategy and introduces the framework behind it, including the Slicer Ambassador program that brought business leaders and community influencers inside district operations, School Funding 101 presentations that built financial literacy among staff and the public, the adoption of ParentSquare to close a communication equity gap for Spanish-speaking families, a transparent school closure process that strengthened rather than damaged trust and led to the creation of a CTE Center and an early childhood center, a joint State of the Schools event with the city's economic development organization, and an internal communications strategy that ensured staff heard critical information before the community did.

Attendees will leave with a replicable engagement framework, honest lessons on what worked and what they would do differently, and practical strategies that any Indiana district can adapt, regardless of size or budget. The session includes an interactive component in which participants identify their district's engagement gaps and begin mapping out the next steps they can act on immediately.

Focused Leadership: Creating and Cultivating an Aligned School Board/Superintendent Team (Rm. 138-139)

School boards and superintendents each play a critical role in the effective leadership of Indiana's school districts. When roles, responsibilities, and commitments are unclear or misaligned, district progress and student outcomes can be negatively impacted. High-performing districts, however, are grounded in strong, collaborative governance teams built on trust, clarity, and shared purpose.

In this session, Dr. Daniel Hile will lead a conversation on critical governance understandings and practices that must be clearly defined and internalized to build a productive and aligned school board/superintendent team. Emphasis will be placed on establishing role clarity to strengthen decision-making, improve communication, and increase organizational coherence. Dr. Stephanie Lockwood will share experiences from her first year as superintendent of Marion Community Schools, highlighting how intentional board training, in partnership with Dr. Hile, helped reset the leadership dynamics and establish a unified direction for the district. This process emphasized building team alignment, a shared focus, and mutual respect among board members and between the board and superintendent. As a result, the board and superintendent developed a shared understanding of their distinct yet interconnected roles, leading to the creation of clearly defined board commitments that now serve as the foundation for effective governance practices.
