

Coronavirus Resource Guide Updates

This update supplements the Coronavirus Resource Guide dated August 19, 2020 and was written to direct you to appropriate updated resources and services. It should not be used to replace local, state, or federal guidelines. All references have been provided in-line and in a resource section at the end of the update to help you continue your research. All information has been adapted from state and federal agencies and other quality resources to support and specify the role of the school board during this pandemic.

Updates from the State of Indiana

Executive Orders

There have been two executive orders issued by the Governor since September 16, 2020. One executive order extended the Public Health Emergency and the other one moved the state of Indiana into Stage 5.

The Public Health Emergency was extended from October 2 for another 30 days to November 1, 2020. The Executive Order extending the Public Health Emergency is 20-44 and may be found at

The State of Indiana transitioned into Stage 5 on September 26, 2020. The limit on the number of people at a gathering was lifted but if a gathering will take place with 500 or more people present, the event must submit a plan to the local health officials before the event may take place. The plan is to contain steps to mitigate the spread of COVID-19 at the event and the steps to be addressed include the screening of staff or volunteers, social distance measures, increased sanitation, face coverings, and compliance measures. The plan must be submitted 14 days in advance of the event. The local health department may review the plan and approve, disapprove, or request adjustments to the plan.

Stage 5 requires the wearing of face coverings in schools and on school property in defined situations. These requirements continue through October 17. Indiana State Department of Health

The ISDH posted its recommendations for school operations (in the areas of academic instruction, extracurricular activities, and community engagement) based on the level of COVID-19 in their counties. Their recommendations

Indiana State Board of Education

As previously reported, the State Board of Education modified its rule on reporting average daily membership for state support to allow school corporations to receive 100% tuition support for students enrolled in virtual instruction due to COVID-19 in the Fall of 2020. Updates from the Federal Government

<u>United States Department of Education</u>

The Office for Civil Rights issued a new guidance document dated September 28, 2020, titled "Questions and Answers for K-12 Public Schools in the Current COVID-19 Environment." The document tackles a range of issues, from requiring facemasks for students with disabilities who have difficulty with them, to pursuing Title IX investigations during a pandemic. The Office of Special Education Programs issued a Q & A on September 28, 2020, in response to questions on providing services to students with disabilities during the current COVID-19 environment. The Q & A reminds school officials that, no matter the method chosen for delivering instruction to students, schools remain responsible for ensuring that a free appropriate public education is provided to students with disabilities. Responses to questions suggest that IEP teams need to ensure IEPs are in place for students with disabilities and to be prepared to discuss how IEPs will be implemented if there is a change in the method of the delivery of instruction. <u>United States Department of Agriculture</u>

The United States Department of Agriculture has extended its flexibility for the school summer meal program to December 31, 2020. <u>United States Department of Labor</u>

The United States Department of Labor (USDOL) issued new regulations for the Emergency Paid Sick Leave Act (EPSLA) and the Emergency Family Medical Leave Expansion Act (EFMLEA) leaves of absences. The new regulations are effective **September 16, 2020,** and in part clarify when an intermittent leave may be taken under both Acts. With respect to leaves due to an employee's child's school closing due to COVID-19, the new regulations state each time the school closes and reopens is a separate event for the leave. If a school is on a hybrid schedule, each day the school is closed for virtual learning is a leave day. If the child's school is closed every Tuesday and Thursday for virtual learning, these are separate leave days and intermittent leave does not apply. The new regulations clarify when intermittent leave is needed, the employer must approve it.

A new regulation has been added to address when notice of the need for a leave is required to be provided by the employee or when the employer can require a notice. A notice must be provided by the employee after the first day of the leave and as soon as practicable after the first day of the leave. if the employee knows the days needed for the leave prior to the leave, the employee must provide notice to the employee. The employer may require a notice of the leave by the employee before the leave if the employee knows of the need for the leave and on or after the first day of the leave when the need for the leave is not known in advance. The notice must include the employee's name, the dates of the leave, the qualifying reason(s) for the leave, and an oral or written statement the employee is unable to work or telework because of the reason(s) for the leave.

<u>United States Department of Homeland Security</u>

The Federal Emergency Management Agency announced that it generally will not reimburse states for the costs of cloth face coverings or personal protective equipment in nonemergency settings, including schools. The policy went into effect on September 15, 2020. <u>United States Department of Health and Human</u> <u>Services</u>

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services will be providing up to 125 million cloth masks to states for distribution to schools. The Administration intends for these masks to support students, teachers, and staff in public and private schools reopening, with an emphasis on students who are low-income or otherwise with high needs and schools providing inperson instruction.
